Feud A feud, referred to in more extreme cases as blood feud, vendetta, faida, beef, or private war, is a long-standing argument or struggle, often by social groups, especially families or clans. The feud begins because one side perceives itself to have been attacked, insulted or judged by the other. Intense resentment triggers initial retribution, which makes the other side feel just as exhausted and vindictive. The dispute is then fuelled by a long cycle of revenge violence. This constant cycle of provocation and revenge makes it very difficult to end the feud peacefully. Feuds often involve family members and/or associates of the original political parties, can last for generations and can lead to extreme acts of violence. They can be interpreted as the extreme growth of social relationships based on family honor. Romeo and Juliet is also a great example of the feud between two families, Montagues and Capulets. Until the earliest time, hostilities were considered legal acts and regulated to some extent.
